Pilgrimages are a somewhat forgotten tradition in the Catholic Church, although they used to be almost a staple of Catholic culture. The many benefits obtained, the graces granted by God, the great benefit to the faithful make them a practice which can be revived with great profit.

The first Catholic pilgrimages were to the Holy Land, to visit the sites of Our Savior's birth, life, and death. Over time, the tombs of the martyrs became popular sites as well, where people would go to venerate their holy memory, ask for favors, or deepen their own commitment to Christ.

As pilgrims began to frequent these sites more and more often over the centuries, it became evident that many graces and fruits were granted by God, such as greater sorrow for sin, amendment of life, deeper conviction to give one's life for Christ, and so on.

Holy Mother Church, seeing the great benefit that pilgrimages brought to the faithful, began to grant indulgences to those who made such a journey, to entice those who otherwise may not have gone.

Priests and confessors noticed as well the good effect pilgrimages had on great sinners, and so began assigning them as penances, as a way to ensure a reform of life. When one has sacrificed a great deal for something, he is not likely to let it slip away easily. Thus great sinners were less likely to relapse into sin, if in order to obtain forgiveness, they had had to go to such great lengths to obtain it, in addition to disposing themselves to receive the graces God offered.

Over the years, as pilgrimages became more and more popular, companies of pilgrims began to be organized to the more popular sites, to the point where they started to become annual events. Those who were too old or infirm to make a pilgrimage themselves, offered financial assistance to others, contributing to the popularity and availability of such journeys.

The benefits of making a pilgrimage are many, not the least of which is the plenary indulgence granted to those who go on an officially sanctioned event. In recent years, the Chartres Pilgrimage in France has become such, as well as the Three Hearts Pilgrimage in Oklahoma.

Pilgrimages are typically undertaken to make atonement for sin, to venerate a particular place or object, to request a significant favor, or to give thanks for favors received. A more succinct way of stating these would be atonement, adoration, petition, and thanksgiving, which are the four ends of prayer.

A pilgrimage thus considered becomes a prayer we make with our whole being. The faculties of body, mind and soul come together for a common purpose. Every step a pilgrim takes in his journey can be considered another act of adoration, another tear shed for sin, another act of gratitude for favors received, another humble request that his petitions be granted.

I do encourage every Catholic to consider going on a pilgrimage at least one in his lifetime, and experiencing the powerful graces made available by God. Whether at home or abroad, there are opportunities to take advantage of these great graces, and reap the spiritual benefit to his soul.
